MICHIGAN VOTING RIGHTS



Can I Vote with a Conviction ?

People with felony and misdemeanor convictions can vote in Michigan. Upon release from jail and prison, voting rights are automatically restored, even if you are on probation or parole.



What if I don't have an address ?

You don't need an address to register to vote. You can use cross streets or an intersection to register if you don't have a permanent address.



Where can I register to Vote?

You can register to vote at any secretary of State office.



What if I dont Have a Photo ID?

Photo ID is NOT required to vote in Michigan. If you do not have ID you can still sign a sworn statement called an affidavit, and still cast a ballot on election day.



What if I'm in Jail awaiting Trial?

If you are in jail awaiting trial, and are not serving time for another offense, you CAN vote. People in pre-trial detention can register and vote in Michigan.

Voter Registration Application and Michigan Driver License/ Personal Identification Card Address Change Form

1 You can use this form to:

- Register to vote in Michigan.
- Change your name or address on your voter registration.

If you have never voted in Michigan and choose to submit this form by mail, you must appear in person to vote in the first election in which you wish to participate. This requirement does not apply if (1) you personally hand deliver this form to your county, city or township clerk's office instead of mailing the form (2) you are 80 years of age or more (3) you are disabled or (4) you are eligible to vote under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act.

2 To register to vote in Michigan you must be:

- A resident of Michigan and the city or township where you are applying to register to vote.
- A citizen of the United States of America.
- At least 18 years of age (by election day).
- Not serving a sentence in jail or prison.

3 Voter registration and driver license address must be the same

Michigan law states that the same address must be used for voter registration and driver license purposes. Therefore, if the residence address you provide on this form differs from the address shown on a driver license or personal identification card issued by the State of Michigan, the Secretary of State will automatically change your driver license or personal identification card address to match the residence address entered on this form. If an address change is made, the Secretary of State will mail you an address update sticker for your driver license or personal identification card.

4 Identifying the city or township where you live

Every person residing in Michigan lives in either a city or a township. If you do not know the name of your city or township, please describe your location in the space provided for *no house or street address*. Providing cross streets/roads and landmarks will help the clerk correctly identify your city or township.

6 Mailing address option provided

If you would prefer to receive mail related to your voter registration or driver license/personal identification card at an address other than your residential address, provide a mailing address where indicated on the form. If you provide a mailing address, it will not appear on your voter I.D. card or driver license/personal identification card.

6 Mail or hand deliver this form to your city or township clerk

If you live within the city limits of one of the cities listed on the reverse side of this sheet, mail or hand deliver the application directly to the clerk of that city. If you do not live within one of the listed cities but you know or can locate the address of your city or township clerk, mail or hand deliver the application directly to that clerk. Otherwise, mail or hand deliver the application to your county clerk. (The addresses of Michigan's 83 county clerks are also listed on the reverse side of this sheet.) The county clerk will forward it to your city or township clerk. Completed applications must be received or postmarked by the close of registration for an election in order to be effective for that election.

Are you registering to vote in Michigan for the first time?

If you have never voted in Michigan and choose to submit this form by mail, you must meet a new identification requirement provided under federal law. To comply with the identification requirement, you must:

- (1) accurately enter your state issued driver license number or personal ID card number where requested on this form.

or

- (2) send one of the following forms of identification when mailing this form to your county, city or township clerk: a COPY of a current and valid photo identification (such as a driver license or personal ID card) or a COPY of a paycheck stub, utility bill, bank statement or a government document which lists your name and address.

DO NOT SEND ORIGINAL DOCUMENTS BY MAIL.

If you are subject to the identification requirement and do not meet the requirement as explained above, an acceptable form of identification will be requested before you vote in the first election in which you wish to participate.

Note: The identification requirement does not apply if (1) you personally hand deliver this form to your county, city or township clerk's office instead of mailing this form (2) you are disabled or (3) you are eligible to vote under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act.

Contact your city or township clerk if you have any questions

Your application is not valid until accepted by the clerk of the city or township in which you reside. If you do not receive a voter I.D. card within three weeks or have any questions, contact your clerk.

Freedom Ink Tattoo Removal Program

What is Freedom Ink?

A volunteer service provided by dermatologists and certified medical professionals to remove tattoos for people coming out of a prison or gang lifestyle.

******For a reasonable fee tattoo removal service is also offered to the general public (sliding scale fee only allowable with proper documentation)******

How can I qualify?

To receive this service, participants must commit to a gang and drug-free lifestyle, be employed or currently seeking employment, in an effort to change their lives, eliminate stigmatizing obstacles to employment and to overall healthy lives, and to foster positive community interactions. Participants should perform at least 20 hours of community service or pay \$25.00 a session.

When are services provided and where?

Volunteer doctors provide services bi-weekly at Detroit Hispanic Development Corporation (DHDC) 1211 Trumbull Detroit, MI 48216.

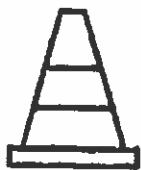

@ Southwest Economic Solutions (SWES) and Focus: HOPE

Earn + Learn serves low-income residents of Detroit, Highland Park, and Hamtramck who are challenged in finding employment because they are disconnected from education and jobs or have criminal backgrounds. Participants must be 18 years of age and older. 18 - 24 year old minority males are a target of our efforts, though the program is open to men and women of all ages.

Those interested in the program must score 6th grade or higher in reading and math, pass an initial and future drug tests, and be interviewed by a staff person to determine their readiness to succeed.

Earn + Learn programs are offered throughout the year to prepare participants not just for jobs, but for succeeding in their lives and careers. We focus on inspiring and supporting participants as they develop positive goals and work to be actively contributors to their families and communities.

The program, free of cost to participants, offers the following:

1. A significant relationship with a case manager, who:
 - + Reviews participants' screening results – including a GAIN or TABE reading and math skills assessment, drug screen and background check, career assessments, as well as their own reporting in intake documents – and then conducts initial interviews, which include reviewing the program requirements to determine individuals' readiness to succeed
 - + Addresses individuals' initial barriers by offering supports or referring them to needed resources. For example, a client may need housing, mental health or substance abuse counseling prior to entering the program. Earn + Learn works with community partners to offer all needed assistance
 - + Provides bus tickets or gas cards and stipends during training and addresses challenges participants may encounter while offering encouragement and support
 - + Works with participants, along with Earn + Learn Job Developers, to help them obtain jobs
 - + Maintains a supportive relationship with participants throughout training and their first year of employment, offering coaching and addressing any issues that arise. Earn + Learn also helps individuals find new jobs if the first ones don't work out
 - + Tracks employment success to evaluate the effectiveness of the Earn + Learn program

2. Centers for Working Families supports:

- + A **Community Resource Navigator** conducts benefits screenings to ensure that participants are receiving all available public benefits they are eligible for
- + A **Financial Coach** offers training during Work Readiness; assists participants in analyzing and improving credit scores; works on budgeting and opening banking accounts; assists with debts including driving tickets, fees and fines; and arranges for various types of financial assistance. The Financial Coach's assistance is available for up to three years after entering the program

3. Full-time 4-Week Work Readiness Programs that mirror the demands of jobs – including stringent attendance and expectations' policies – to prepare participants to succeed at work. They include:

- + **Reading and math skills enhancement** – Sessions focus on improving reading comprehension, writing, math and studying skills. Students conduct research projects to learn more about their intended careers
- + **Work readiness training** – These sessions are dedicated to exploring values and goal setting; constructive communications, team work and conflict resolution; diversity, time and stress management; positive thinking; and other topics critical to success at work, with a focus on professionalism and the four "As" – Academics, Attendance, Attitude, Appearance
- + **Customer service skills** – This certificate program prepares participants to successfully interact with customers, co-workers and supervisors on the job
- + **Computer job search skills** – These sessions prepare participants to use a computer to manage documents including resumes, cover and thank you letters and references, and to conduct on-line job searches and applications. Participants also produce a Power Point research project
- + **Financial fitness** – A financial coach leads 2 or 3 short workshops during the program
- + **Additional certifications** – Participants can also receive First Aid/CPR and OSHA certifications

4. Vocational Training as needed – Earn + Learn works with local Michigan Works! Agencies to access vocational training funding as available and also partners with other training providers and programs to offer options. Focus: HOPE offers its advanced manufacturing and information technology programs to qualified participants. SWES offers a food industry futures program and production operator certificate program with partners.**5. "Launch to Work Week"** – At SWES, after Work Readiness and/or vocational training, participants:

- + Re-take the GAIN or TABE math and reading assessment to learn how effective the program has been at improving math and reading skills
- + Finalize their resumes and review interviewing and other work readiness skills
- + Schedule individual appointments with their case manager and financial coach

6. Peer Support and other Opportunities – Earn + Learn offers occasional workshops, graduate networking sessions, and links to other services available at SWES and Focus: HOPE.

Coordinated Assessment Model Detroit

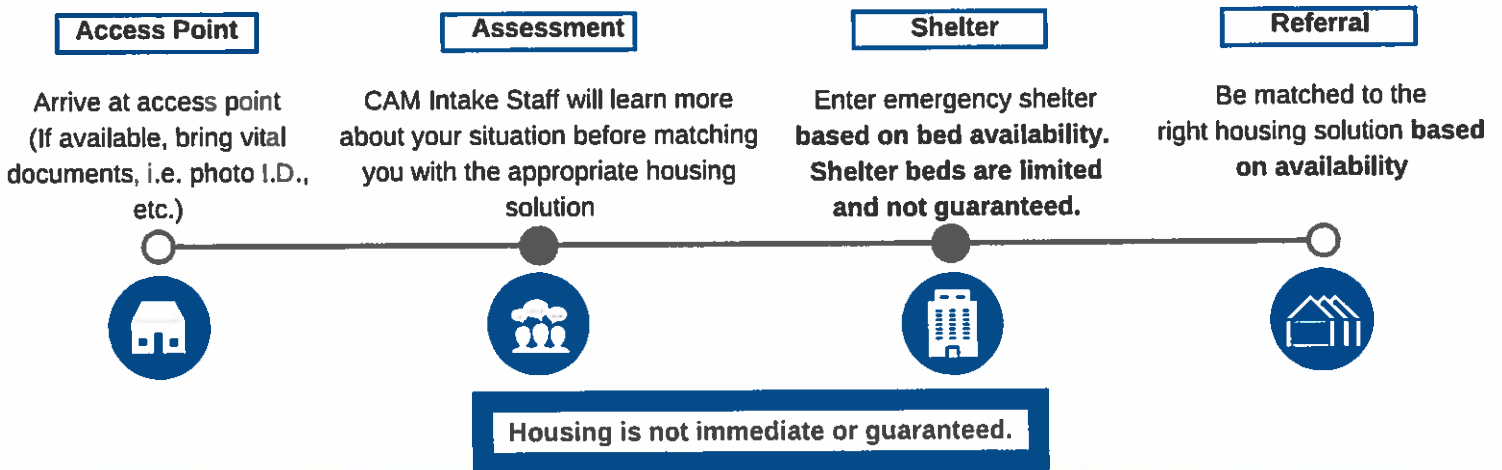
Coordinated Assessment Model (CAM) is an organized process that focuses on matching the needs of people experiencing homelessness with available shelter and housing resources in Detroit, Highland Park, and Hamtramck.

Someone experiencing literal homelessness is:

- Living in a place not meant for human habitation (i.e. in a car, in an abandoned home, on the streets, etc.), or
- Living in emergency shelter, or
- Fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence, or
- Leaving an institution (i.e. hospital, nursing home, treatment, jail, etc.) where they lived for up to 90 days and were in a shelter or a place not meant for human habitation directly before entering that institution

Living with friends and family is not considered literally homeless

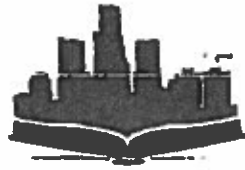

Suicide Warning Signs

These signs may mean someone is at risk for suicide. Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

- ◆ Talking about wanting to die or to kill oneself.
- ◆ Looking for a way to kill oneself, such as searching online or buying a gun.
- ◆ Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live.
- ◆ Talking about feeling trapped or in unbearable pain.
- ◆ Talking about being a burden to others.
- ◆ Increasing the use of alcohol or drugs.
- ◆ Acting anxious or agitated; behaving recklessly.
- ◆ Sleeping too little or too much.
- ◆ Withdrawing or feeling isolated.
- ◆ Showing rage or talking about seeking revenge.
- ◆ Displaying extreme mood swings.

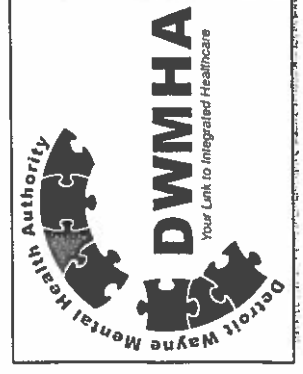

How to Access Routine Mental Health Services



Who is Eligible for Mental Health Services?

The Detroit Wayne Mental Health Authority is responsible for mental health services for Wayne County's two million residents. Our Authority ensures a vast array of services and programs that serve individuals who have or are at risk of developing mental illness, developmental disabilities, severe emotional disturbances and substance use disorders or individuals with co-occurring mental illness and substance use disorders. This includes infants, children, adolescents, adults and older adults.

Services available to the general public include:

- Information & Referral
- Crisis Intervention/Suicide Prevention
- Disaster Mental Health Prevention
- Consultation & Education

Additionally, CMH is responsible for the mental health and substance use services for persons with the following:

Steps to Access Routine Mental Health Services

Step 1: Contact the DWMHA 24-Hour Centralized Access Center at:

for a community mental health provider of your choice.

Step 2: The Access Center Representative will provide you with a telephone screening to determine your needs.

Step 3: After the screening the Access Center will determine if you meet criteria for community mental health services with a MCPN. (In order to enroll you must choose one of the five (5) MCPNs for services).

Step 4: Access will schedule an appointment for a face-to-face evaluation with a mental health provider closest to you.

Step 5: Upon enrollment eligibility you will be mailed a confirmation letter & welcome packet with your appointment date and orientation notice.

Step 6: At your appointment you will be given a form to fill out and sign to confirm the selection of the MCPN of your choice.

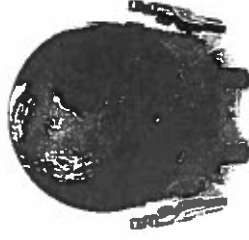

EXPUNGEMENT 101

Step 1: Eligibility

In Michigan, the state allows you to have one felony or misdemeanor conviction set aside. It must meet certain criteria. You may not have records expunged if :

1. The maximum sentence for the crime is life in prison, even if you received a lesser sentence
2. You were convicted of committing or attempting to commit a sex crime
3. The conviction was traffic-related
4. You have additional convictions, other than up to 2 minor offenses on your record
5. Cases involving child abuse, using a computer to solicit a minor or stalking, operating while intoxicated (felony), felony domestic violence (if you also have a misdemeanor domestic violence), human trafficking, or terrorism

You must wait five years after your conviction or release from prison before your record can be expunged.

Juveniles may have adjudications set aside if they have 3 or less juvenile offenses on their record. They must not have any felony convictions.

Step 2: Documents and Info You Will Need

You will need to fill out an application for expungement or record sealing, and file it with the court that handled your case. The prosecutor, state police, and general attorney will also need copies of your application.

You also may have need:

- 1. A fingerprint card for the State police (obtained from any Michigan law enforcement agency)**
- 2. A certified copy of your conviction record**
- 3. The name and address of the prosecutor in your case (which should be on your conviction record or can be found in the Michigan Prosecuting Attorney Office Directory)**

Step 3: After Expungement is Granted

If the judge orders your conviction set aside, you will need to make sure records at all relevant agencies, such as state police, Department of Corrections, and other agencies that may have criminal records, receive a copy of the order from either you or the court. It takes about a month to remove records from the state's Internet Criminal History Access Tool (ICHAT). It is a good idea to check ICHAT and verify with other agencies that your records have been removed

Step 4: Seek Help If Necessary

The information provided is very general and may not apply to your particular situation. An experienced lawyer can offer specific legal advice, help you figure out if you qualify for expungement, and submit the paperwork on your behalf.
