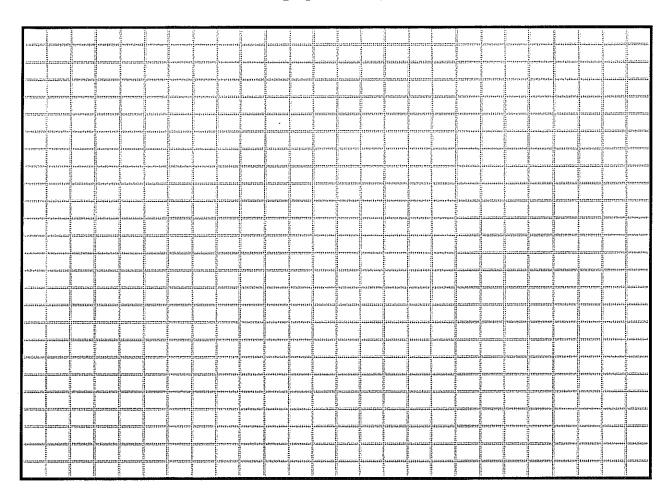

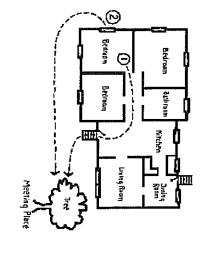

- © Know two ways out of every room in your house
- Practice your escape plan with your family
- © Remember to crawl low in smoke, where the good air is
- Feel doors before you open them - if they are warm, do not open them. Use a second exit
- Mave a meeting place outside, like a tree or mailbox
- © Test smoke alarms every month and change the batteries at least once each year

Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives!



immediately!

A working smoke alarm can **double** your chances of surviving a fire!

- You should have at least one smoke alarm on every floor of your home and one in each sleeping area.
- Smoke rises. Place your smoke alarm on or near the ceiling and at least three feet away from air vents.
- Test your smoke alarms every month AND replace batteries once a year.
- When you clean your home, remember your smoke alarm!
- Never "borrow" the smoke alarm battery for other uses.
- If you hear your smoke alarm make a chirping noise, replace the battery immediately.

Is Your Home Fire Safe?

Check for fire hazards in your (home and correct any problems



- ✓ Matches and lighters stored out of reach of children
- No overloaded outlets or worn/frayed appliance or extension cords

- ☑ Flammable liquids or aerosols stored away from heat sources
- Heating equipment kept three feet away from curtains, furniture and papers
- Fireplaces kept screened and cleaned regularly
- No gasoline stored in the house or basement
- ✓ No curtains or towel racks close to the stove
- Stoves, ovens and microwaves kept clean and free of grease
- Working smoke alarms on every floor of your home and in every sleeping area

STOP, DROP & ROLL If Your Clothes Catch on Fire



STOP Never run!



DROP to your knees, then lie flat on the ground with your hands covering your face



ROLL over and over to smother the fire
